How does it work?

When we meet someone for the first time, we set to work finding out everything we need to know to make what we do work for them:

- What makes them happy?
- What don't they like?
- Do they have any special interests?
- What do they struggle with?

With the information we gather, we guide each person towards the activities and sessions we think they'll find the most rewarding. Nothing we do is set in stone and sessions can be tailored to cater for people's particular hobbies or interests, where possible.

An autism-friendly environment

Everything about the Autism Hub has been designed to make people feel relaxed, safe and in control. We limit visitors to no more than ten per day, so noise levels and crowds don't become overwhelming, and our decor is all in autism-friendly pastel colours.

Everyone who comes to the Autism Hub is given a personalised timetable in whichever format works for them, so there are no unexpected suprises.

How much does it cost?

Customers are charged per day attended. The Autism Hub is open from 9am-4pm and people can attend for the whole day or in smaller blocks of time.

The cost will be assessed by social services depending on your income.
